

What sets Herschel apart are the 75 years of excellence in education that you have all been part of. Reflecting on the contributions of a few of the most pupils to single out Jean Lewentz (School who turns 90 in 1999) and launched her second book, "Hatching Out" in October. Shadiah Henderson (Baxter) turned 90 recently and we are reminded of her Ficks with Honorel, her father, William Duncan Baxter being a teacher at the school. Brenda Lyne Stempel (Tyne) has awarded a bursary to the daughter of an Old Herschelian to be implemented in 2000 (see elsewhere in Newsletter).

Last year we talked about strategic planning and the implications. Today we dwell briefly on the big picture of this planning and some of the outcomes. The buildings envisaged are well underway. The refurbished classroom and upgrading of the administrative offices have been completed. There is an enlarged drama room and the promise of additional teaching rooms and more music practice rooms.

The size of the school is within bounds. We are embarked on a course of 4 classes to the 11th and no class will be bigger than 25. Many more girls are taking science and mathematics hence the recruitment of two new teachers in these subjects for 1999.

There is an Outreach co-ordinator ensuring that every girl is involved in community awareness. Information technology is pervading all areas of learning and a fibre-optic backbone is to be established, networking all classrooms. Guidance and Career counselling departments are thriving and meeting the needs of the girls.

The involvement of women such as yourselves is invaluable. What you have achieved is vital for the success of the school and we need you to keep supporting the school, now more than ever! One of the need for role-modelling and example in diverse careers. We need to establish a database and hope you will assist by being prepared to help with information or with the opportunity for placement in your particular profession. We have two Old Herschelians on the school council; Lynn Reid (Harris) has served the school faithfully for many years, and there we have Professor Alex Whelan (Adams) with her special ability in finances.

We need positive attitudes and belief in the wonderful tradition established at Herschel. You have all been part of this. Remember how important you are, keep in contact, and come and visit the school. We have so much to build upon and so much to look forward to.

1958 REUNION

The "Kinging Parties" celebration was a running feast that started in London on June 6 1958 and ended 48 hours later in Worcester, U.K.

This remarkable class is one of Henschel's heritage magic years. A pioneer grand old one!

Seated at world-wide meetings of the 1958 matric class to meet held a reunion he had, consequently when it did take place it was a thundering success. An impressive number came to London from South Africa, and others from Portugal and the United States. Our total was 18 and the numbers swelled on June 7 when the second phenomenal party was held, this time with husbands and other guests.

The first celebration took place at the Royal Commonwealth Club which had recently been opened by the Queen. In a purposely chosen round-proofed room, larded with proteins, the girls howled with delight at the many hilarious stories.

In 1945, when our class entered the Herschel Kindergarten we wore party dresses, it school as there was no uniform. We were equally taught, girls and boys together, by "Edgie Hyman" (Hilary Harsant), and then progressed to Helen Botha-Kelid, Audrey Walker-Smith, and others. Over the 12 years, from 1946 to 1958, many girls came and went from above, below and even sideways, bringing our grand total to 46. Nine remain untraced but 37 are, we know, still kicking high, which is an encouraging number.

Throughout our time at Herschel the beautiful grounds were enhanced by graceful ornaments, now a protected species and South Africa's national bird. This early exposure to the blue crane led to a life-long interest for Heather MARR (Busby) who now participates in the annual national blue crane count.

Our 1958 year produced many excellent people. Careers cover the fields of medicine, music, public relations, catering, psychiatry, the social sciences, anthropology, the diplomatic corps, farming, teaching, the media, tourism, several talented artists and business women.

The second party was held at Wolverton Hall, the elegant Queen Anne home of Sue ELLIOTT and her husband, Ian, son of old Herschelian, Beatrice Elliott (nee Mac ACHLAN). The ladies' wacraft and kindness will long be remembered, as will the buffet, exquisitely and professionally produced by Jose FINCH (Lalor), ably assisted by Val DE KLERK (Osberry), Caroline SYMONDS (Dewles) and others. An added bonus was the presence of Lyn HOLMES (1955, Mary's) and her husband, Dudley, from Stellenbosch and Gill GARLICK (Dunlop) and her husband, Des, from Hazarensburg in the Northern Province.

As the conversation, wine and laughter flowed a video camera was being expertly handled by Neil McCaffrey, husband of Mrs HOLMES McCaffrey), a daunting task that he took in his stride. This must be the first time a Bishop's boy has received an acknowledgement in the Herschel newsletter! Many thanks, Neil.

Thanks must go to everyone who helped, organised and attended the Reunion and who made it such a terrific weekend. Follow-up parties are already being planned and we hope that those who were not able to attend will make it next time. It will be worth it. Out of the past, our formative years have been revived and we can now look forward, after 40 years, to a more united future. On this day, past, present and still to come!

MEMOIRS OF JEAN LAWRENCE.

As the oldest surviving Frenchman, Jean St. Léger Lawrence (nee Sordic, 1925) was paid a visit by His Excellency, Mrs Diana van Zyl and Mrs Cindy Grobler, Liaison Officer, of the launch on her second book in October.

Genial and full possessed of the unworldly joy of life as she nears her 90th birthday, Jean is an exemplary representative of a bygone era and of a time which she has lovingly captured in her memoirs, entitled "Fighting On".

This is her second book of memoirs, as the wife of cabinet minister Harry Lawrence, who served under two successive South African premiers, Generals Janzog and Strijdom, in the 1930s and 1940s.

Daughter of Cape Town's Supreme Court Judge, Malcolm Sordic, Jean is also the great-niece of Frederick York St. Léger, the co-founder and first editor of the Cape Times. Still resident in the apartment in Kuilsburg that she has called home for the past 50 years, Jean celebrated the launch of her new work with a gathering of about 40 of her closest friends and family.

Down-playing her own merit and instead complimenting her surviving son, Jeremy, for writing her books, Jean displays yet another characteristic of years gone by in not allowing too much of a fuss to be made of her work.

The book, however, despite all modesty, is a delight to read and reveals the insight and dignity of a long and fascinating life, all of them evoking the reality of a history that has been rather drifted by text book writers. Here the hints in behind the scenes puts back the heart of the story and the selfishness of some situations are viewed in a new and very accessible way through Jean's easy-reading style.

Jean's first book, "Coming Home to Russia", was well received and detailed her early life in the family home designed by Herbert Baker, Highlands, in Wynberg.

Because she has survived many tragedies and losses within the family, Jean's strength of character and quick wit are more appreciated and a quiet lesson learnt, is simply that the world goes on and so must one, in the very best manner one can.
