

I am delighted to have this opportunity to renew contact with you through the Old Herschelian newsletter. This enables me to thank Collins Symons, Di Burns and the enthusiastic, hard-working Old Herschelians' committee and to congratulate them on the tremendous success of the 1993 Old Herschelians' Art Exhibition held in the school auditorium. The wonderful interest, support and attendance, as well as many rewarding sales for our talented Old Herschelians artists, realized a total of over R20 000, of which the school received a splendid R5 000 with which to initiate an Old Herschelians Bursary Fund.

A 100% Matric pass made 1993 another successful academic year. The 34 Matric candidates achieved a 94,8% matric exemption and there were 8 'A' aggregates and 54 subject distinctions. We were very proud of our 1993 head girl, Nicola Clegg. She achieved 7 A's and was placed 18th in the top 20.

Academic, sporting and cultural achievements have been aided by improved facilities — the library Resource Centre is well used; there are two new music rooms and refurbished guide us rooms. The Preparatory School boarding house has closed and the four remaining boarders have been accommodated in the senior house. At the Prep, new computers, enlarged classrooms and improved gardens all reflect continued progress. Future plans include the completion of Chapel refurbishing; upgrading the senior science labs and the development of an indoor community/sports centre.

Both schools are at maximum numbers (with waiting lists) — we have faith in our product and in this exciting, challenging year in South Africa's history, we have faith in the future.

Old Herschelian, Sue MacGregor, spent a morning with us last November. She endeared herself to everyone and has kindly sent us the tapes of the radio programme she made during her visit. We are proud of those pupils and teachers who participated in the interviews and it is lovely to hear our school song (composed by the 1994 head girl, Thandi Sibani) on the tape. We hope that the series was heard by Old Herschelians living in England.

Old Herschelians are always welcome visitors to the school — we truly value your ongoing interest and support.

There was a record turnout of fifty-four people who enjoyed a delicious three-course meal and wine. The guest speaker was Nigel Murphy, well-known broadcaster and presenter of 'Microphone-In' and 'The Editors'. Mr Murphy, who is himself an Old Herschelian, entitled his talk "Murphy behind the Mike". He gave a most entertaining and interesting talk on communication in general, and radio in particular, and invited questions afterwards. The atmosphere was very relaxed and friendly and it was pleasing to see so many new faces present. Many people are reluctant to attend feeling that they may not know anyone, but these occasions are really great fun and not at all intimidating.

### **OLD HERSCHELIAN SPRING ART EXHIBITION**

At a meeting of the Old Herschelians' Committee in March, it was decided to raise money to establish a bursary fund for the daughters of Old Herschelians. An art exhibition was planned for October. Artists, either Old Herschelians or members of the extended Herschel Family, were approached and responded enthusiastically. Over 140 exhibits were received, including oils, water colours, lithographs, pastels, charcoals, sculptures, ceramics and paper-maché. The opening was set for Wednesday 6th October at 6 p.m. and the committed and enthusiastic volunteers worked valiantly to have everything ready on time. The venue, the Atrium at Herschel, provided the perfect setting being bright, airy and spacious. The exhibition was opened by Linda Hansen van Vuuren, National President of the South African Association of Arts, before a large gathering of invited guests and Old Herschelians. There was great excitement as the first sales were made. The exhibition remained open for three days and it was encouraging to see a proliferation of red stickers, as a steady stream of visitors came to view, and more importantly buy!

The Mosaic Art was on display in the Mary Jagger Hall at the same time which gave added interest, with a variety of styles and subjects, and a uniformly high standard. A percentage of the sales was retained for the bursary fund, and we were delighted to launch the project with a sum of R5 000. We must now make this sum grow by regular fund-raising events, so that we can establish a really worthwhile bursary. Very many thanks to all who helped with this initial venture; there are too many to mention by name but they include the artists, staff, pupils, parents, Old Herschelians, members of the Herschel Family and an enthusiastic and hard-working committee.

## OBITUARIES

### Dulcie FOWER

Dulcie died at the age of 84. A legend in her lifetime, she was a founder pupil at Herschel in 1922 and always had close ties with the school.

Dr Howes (Mrs Guy Cronwright) made an outstanding contribution to the cultural life of Cape Town and South Africa, earning an international reputation. She founded the LCI Ballet School in 1934 and Opus Ballet in 1963, of which she was artistic director. She was also patron of the Balletomanes.

Described as a pioneer, the doyenne of South African ballet was born at Durban on 31 1908 at Little Brak River. At 16 she went overseas and trained in London and Paris. She returned to South Africa in 1927 after having toured with the Anna Pavlova Company. She joined the staff of LCI in 1934.

Dr Howes was also the first woman director of the Little Theatre in Cape Town where she produced theatre as well as ballet.

Dulcie is survived by two daughters, Amelia Brown (1954) and Victoria Cowman (1966) both Old Herschelians, while her granddaughter, Alexandra Cowman, is in Standard 3 at Herschel.

Dulcie graciously agreed to be the Patron of Herschel Ahead, the appeal to build the theatre; she gave sensible and practical advice on the seating plan. She was also present on Founders' Day 1992 when the school celebrated its 70th birthday. She cut the cake and said a few words.

Dulcie was a wonderful role model for today's Herschel girls, always elegant, very caring and understanding, gentle yet strong. We treasure her memory and share with her family the loss of a wonderful mother and a very special past pupil and friend.

Nancy MORRIS (nee Howe)

Nancy, a long-standing member of the Herschel Family, passed away peacefully on 22 June 1993. A school prefect, she married in 1947 and was later Chairman of the Old Herschellians' Association in the mid 1980's.

Nancy will be remembered as a person with many admirable qualities. Warm and unselfish, she had a very real concern for those who were in trouble, the deprived and the underprivileged, and would go out of her way to assist and make good wherever possible. She had a strong sense of justice and firm convictions, she was prepared to take a stand and contest a point with reasoned argument. She was also dedicated, practical and efficient, ensuring that any task she undertook would be done to the best of her ability.

Nancy was actively involved in her church and also the Democratic Party, truly believing that the political wings in our country needed to be reformed. She was a loving and proud wife, mother and grandmother, totally dedicated to her family and friends.

Above all, Nancy will be remembered for her tremendous sense of honour and zest for life. The Minister at her memorial service summed her up perfectly: "A lady of indomitable spirit". All those who knew Nancy will remember her with great affection.

Margaret SAFFERY.

When I arrived at Herschel in Sub-B, Margaret Saffery was already an "institution", loved and admired for her gifted teaching and shrewd personality.

She taught me (and so many others) Speech and Drama throughout our school years, and I will always be indebted to her for the love and appreciation of dramatic art and literature that she so generously shared with her pupils.

How well I remember our weekly Speech lessons, we must have been quite a handful, always wanting to hijack the lessons and indulge in our own 'improvisations' or 'let's make it up as we go along' dramatic works! Mrs Saffery was always so patient and tolerant, yet she was unquestionably in control. I learned so much from her. Years later, when I was admitted to the Postgraduate Acting course at the Webber Douglas Academy of Dramatic Art in London, it struck me that the grounding she had given me was quite superb. She had the ability to recognise and nurture talent and to extract the best from every pupil, not only the budding Bernards!

Her productions were, without exception, excellent, and under her guidance, Herschel acquired a justifiably fine reputation for the calibre of its drama department. Her dearest wish was to see a properly equipped theatre added to the school's resources, how she would have enjoyed working in the present magnificent theatre complex.

Teachers are rarely adequately thanked and rewarded for their many special lessons they impart to others. From Mrs Saffery I learnt about dignity, graciousness, humility and confidence. Herself an accomplished actress, she never tired of working with her pupils to achieve something 'magical'.

I will never forget her brilliant rendition of Noel Coward's "Nina from Argentina" (with a harpouzine as accompaniment), we were forever nagging her to 'do it again', but like all true performers, she knew how to leave an audience wanting more!

Herschelians, past and present, owe her a great deal, she was a truly exceptional teacher, actress and human being. I will always remember her with love and with the deepest gratitude.

Lady YOUNG of Dartington (nee Sasha, or Ruth, MOORSOM)  
Sasha died on 22 June 1993. She was born in Hampshire in 1931 and educated at Herschel until she returned to England in 1946, to complete her schooling at Bedales. At Girton College, Cambridge she attracted great praise as an actress and took a double first in English. She became one of the BBC's first women producers. She brought the poems of Ted Hughes and Philip Larkin to a Radio Three audience, years before they became household names. Her most recent discovery among writers was Mary Sietman, who, after being urged by Sasha to continue with her writing, published her first novel, "Jumping the Queue", under the name Mary Wesley. She married sociologist, Michael Young, now Lord Young of Dartington, in 1966. After leaving the BBC she combined raising two children with editing the education magazine, "Where?" and writing a regular column for The Listener. She published two novels, the first of which "The Lavender Trip" won two first novel awards in 1976. In 1963 she published "In the Shadow of the Paradise Tree", a satirical account of expatriate life. She helped her husband with many projects, including the Open College of the Arts, now part of the Open University. Apart from her writing talent, she was an accomplished painter, photographer and sculptor, and had poems published in The Observer and The New Statesman.

Towards the end of her life she developed a keen interest in Buddhism, which she was introduced to by her daughter, Sophie, a Buddhist.
