

The highlight was a three-week trip through the mid-west covering Colorado, Arizona, Wyoming, Utah and New Mexico. We visited Yellowstone with all its diverse natural wonders, enjoying the wild life particularly. Old Faithful gushed on time, admired by people from almost every nation. The mountain and lake scenery in the Grand Teton area, south of Yellowstone, was very worthwhile. We were able to raft down one of the rivers obtaining unusual views of the area.

Exploring the depths of Bryce Canyon on horseback provided a lovely contrast, the weirdly shaped cliffs and rock formations in brilliant pink and orange were unforgettable. A short day in Zion and then on to the Grand Canyon provided a fitting and memorable trip.

During the last few months of our stay, we encountered an icy cold winter, some contrast to the heat of the summer where temperatures of over 100°F are run-of-the-mill. The clouds laid over, our pool could be used as a skating rink and we had to delay our final move as the vans could not reach us.

We were very sad to leave the friendly city of Dallas. The lifestyle is relaxed and casual, the people warm and friendly. It's a city of phenomenal growth, every day the skyline changes, and the city thrives with life and traffic twenty four hours a day.

We returned to S.A. via Hawaii, New Zealand and Australia. A long week was spent on Maui, one of the outer islands, basking in the warm sun and sea. It is as beautiful as the brochures say; palm fringed beaches, luxurious accommodation and balmy nights. Honolulu was very commercialized and we were glad to fly on to Auckland to visit family and explore the North Island.

The last week was spent in Sydney where Johana visited the Calcox Refinery in Botany Bay. Sydney itself is set on the water, numerous little bays and inlets make for idyllic home settings.

Cape Town family and friends gave us a great welcome back. The children settled into their respective schools with barely a murmur. Anton 13 and Andre 7 at SACS, and Tasha 9 at Rustenberg. I seemed to be the only one battling to settle in, perhaps my feet were just too itchy with all the stimulation!"
