FOREWORD

Remote as it may seem from our ordinary activities in and out of school, the crowning of Queen Elizabeth must stand in our thoughts and feelings as the climax of the past year. Quite apart from individual loyalties, the event had a symbolic meaning for all of us; and that meaning lay, not in the act of crowning, not in the pomp and splendour, but in a simple avowal of self-dedication.

Most of us in the School had the opportunity of seeing, very shortly after the event had taken place, the film of the Coronation in London; and perhaps we were made more aware of the pomp and ceremony, the pageant and colour, the age-old traditions, the unity of a people and their loyalty to our Queen. But we became more aware too that in this ceremony the Queen dedicated herself, for life, to a service to her subjects and the Commonwealth. This she did that the earth might become "a juster, kindlier and more gentle place." And that, surely, was the most important message of the Coronation—the will to serve. It is a universal message which has been renewed for us.

Those of us, Staff and pupils alike, who shared in the Queen's experience could not have done so without gaining a new awareness of others, of ourselves and of our individual responsibilities and duties.

FOUNDERS DAY, 1953

This year Founders Day was held on Friday, 13th February. During the morning the School attended the Thanksgiving Service in St. Saviour's Church conducted by the Rev. John Aubrey. The lesson was read by Janette Hofmeyr, and the choir sang the anthem "Ave Verum."

The address was given by His Grace the Archbishop of Cape Town. Taking as his text Genesis XXV, v. 36, "Then Jacob gave Esau bread and pottage of lentils; and he did

eat and drink and rose up and went his way: thus Esau despised his birthright." His Grace prefaced his address by saying that to each one of us a birthright is given, but that we are responsible for guarding and cherishing that right; we may find some day that we are not able to buy it back when once we have lost it. He went on to explain what that birthright is, and found three things to which everyone has a right. Firstly, we are all endowed with the ability to think and reason; secondly, we are endowed with youth and beauty, not only the beauty of our form, but also the beauty in nature; and finally our greatest gift is that we are all the Children of God. On looking at a mountain we may feel that it embodies stability and security, but we must never forget that all earthly things are temporal; only our souls have an eternity.

Prospero was not entirely right when he said:

"And like the baseless fabric of this vision
The cloud-capped towers, the gorgeous palaces,
The solemn temples, the great globe itself,
Yea, all which it inherit, shall dissolve,
And, like the insubstantial pageant faded
Leave not a rack behind."

The soul of man has eternal life, and it is our birthright to be the Children of God.

The Prize-giving was held in the School Hall in the afternoon. Miss McLean in her address said:

Your Grace, Admiral William-Powlett, Ladies and Gentlemen, on behalf of Herschel, I welcome you here today. To the Commander-in-Chief, we are especially grateful for his kindness in coming to speak to us and to present the prizes. We greatly appreciate having him as our guest of honour.

This, my Sixth Report, covers my fifth year, and during it I think there has been progress, co-operation and good leadership, shown both in character development and material achievement; on the latter side, we were extremely happy in the reflected glory of Marion Kneen when her Sonnet was published by "John o' London's Weekly," and we congratulate her; all those who entered for the examinations of the Associated Board of Royal Schools of Music passed, five in the Theory; twenty-three in the Practical, three with Distinction; twenty entered for the School-Leaving Certificate and all passed, three in the First Class, fifteen in the Second, two in the Third; there were four Distinctions and fourteen exemptions from the Matriculation.

There are Exhibitions of our practical work in the Art, Science and Domestic Science Rooms and we hope you will find time to look at them and at any other part of the School.

Our standard of games has improved; this year we won the Junior Section of the Inter-Schools Swimming Gala, tied with Rustenburg for first place in the Netball Tournament and had three representatives in the Provincial Schools Hockey team; for a school of this size the all-round representation is very good.

In the Life Saving, Sheila Francois gained the Instructress Certificate for training the four successful Bronze Medallists.

The House activities continue well, Jagger with C.A.F.D.A., Rolt with Princess Alice Home and Merriman is now adopting the St. Michael's Orphans, housed at the House of Bethany; the Chapel Committee again arranged for their Christmas hampers and presents; the Sociological Club gave their Christmas Party this year to the children at the Protea School, where we were glad to know that my namesake had 100 per cent. for Arithmetic; but all these and the Club activities are reported in the Magazine published today.

Early in the year we visited many of the Van Riebeeck exhibitions and productions, finding much to arouse and stimulate our interest; then we gave ourselves some days extra holiday in order that members of the Durban Girls' College might stay here to visit the Exhibitions, too—a doubtful virtue, this—except for those who came to work in order that beds might be made and rooms ready to receive the guests; I know the guests enjoyed their visit and we did, too.

Later in the year a reading of "The Linden Tree" was given, a different form of production for many of us, but the producer and the readers are to be congratulated on their success.

The very Juniors gave us an hour of their musical ability, which we enjoyed; the Juniors entertained us with two Plays and here, too, the producers and performers were excellent. The Orchestra once again joined the Joint Schools Orchestra to give a concert

in the Banqueting Hall and at Stellenbosch; this Orchestra each year grows in size, ambition and success.

The Choir, which first sang only for Youth Sunday in St. Saviour's Church, has been asked to do so since on increasingly important occasions, a wedding, the Confirmation Service, the Memorial Service for the late King, which took place on Founder's Day last year, and at the Induction of our Rector.

At the end of the year came the Carol Service with its collection and toys for Janet Bourhill, and while I enjoyed last year's music very much, I know that I enjoyed this very much more; is this not accounted for by the difference between being a spectator and a participant in any endeavour, I think so always.

But to turn to my realisation of five years at Herschel, perhaps "with" rather than "as" exemplifies that for which we have striven during these years.

I realise and apologise for what must to you be monotonous repetition, for I find almost without fail I have on each occasion used the words, co-operation, responsibility, Citizenship, Service, self-discipline, for living with a purpose; but it seems to me that one's whole way of life must inculcate these tenets and I wonder what meed of success we have achieved in our endeavour.

There have as well been words of a more material nature which have recurred with the same steady regularity, land, examinations, games, separation of Juniors from Seniors, school officers, bathing cubicles (which I once promised never to mention again), but I only do so now as a start to achievement, for we have them and appreciate them very much; school officers with the greater share of responsibility and ensuing co-operation are proving their worth; external examinations, which, unfortunately, we have always with us, are taking their rightful place without undue emphasis, although this is apt to fall short of perfection.

"Separating Juniors and Seniors" seems very closely allied to "land." In my first report I expressed the hope of having more land in order that the Junior School might be run separately and I do not think I have lost sight of this, nor allowed others to do so either, and to this I know the Council will agree. We are still without more land, but to some extent we have divided Junior and Seniors; the Kindergarten Department under the direction of Miss Harsant and the two Form Mistresses have always been a more separate unit; the Junior School—forms Upper I to Lower III—are now having prayers each morning in the Boarders' Sitting-room; they have their mid-morning break alone as well as their lunch; in this way Miss Porter takes responsibility for this Department, the Form Mistresses see more of their forms and the Junior House Leaders have greater opportunity of showing leadership and being useful members of society; Mrs. Steyn takes responsibility for the Senior School and acts as my deputy; while I am taking more responsibility for the boarding-house. And, in division of responsibility we have certainly made progress, but this is not yet the ideal state and for this we must have more land; as well we need it for playing fields for the Seniors; I know they have reached a good measure of success without it, and I do so agree if you say "the greater the difficulty, the greater the success," but there comes a point beyond which one cannot go, and we have possibly reached that point.

May I then urge you not to lose sight of this need, for I certainly shall not—the land is there now.

And for the less material aims—the words co-operation, responsibility, citizenship, self-discipline, all seem to combine and be indivisible from the other—Service.

And how well this is typified for us this afternoon by those with us on the platform, a Member of the Senior Service to speak to us, one who was a member of this Service and is now our chaplain and too, our Chairman.

Such growth of service as there may be certainly shows in charitable service for others—"charitable" used in the Biblical sense—loveable, for we have given of time and interest as well as in kind. This was clearly shown when we decided to collect our clothes together for the Flood Relief and to give from pocket money; on the money side we did quite well—the clothes, for which time was also given for mending and washing, came far above my expectations and also those of the kind parent who undertook to take them to the Red Cross, for she had to substitute a lorry for her car. May we thank her very much and too the Ladies' Committee who re-sorted the secondhand clothes depot for unsaleable goods.

I hope there has been growth in Service, but I leave the decision to you.

The fact that I feel we have reached the end of a period has perhaps been forced upon me by leave-taking. Last year, Mr. Baxter, at the completion of our first thirty years,

At the end of this year, by three members of Staff who, having worked with us over long periods, decided to go to England.

Miss Walden-Smith, who has looked after the Lower I form for five years and whose work there has been most valuable.

Miss Stevenson, after ten years, during which time she has had charge of the music department and has maintained it always at a very high standard; she has as well been a form mistress and House mistress of Jagger House; in all these her indefatigable enthusiasm and hard work has meant much to the School and we are going to miss her.

Miss Lansdale has been here twelve and a half years, and it would be hard to find one small part of Herschel to which she has not given her wholehearted service at all times. The meticulous detail of her work can perhaps only now be fully realised when one looks through the records she has left us, for she gave no outward appearance of being rushed or hurried, while everything was in its place and on time. Her Service given is one to which I would like to pay tribute, and to thank her for her generous help. I hope that she is enjoying her journey home via the East Coast, that a great welcome awaits her and I wish her every success in the future.

I would thank those of the School, the Staff, the Parents and the Council who by their co-operation have so willingly shared in my endeavour to direct a purpose for living through the ideals of Service, with the hope that we are growing nearer to being able to say, as St. Paul once did: "I am a Citizen of no mean City."

Your Grace, Admiral William-Powlett, Ladies and Gentlemen, I thank you.

Miss McLean's report was followed by the prize-giving. The Vice-Admiral South Atlantic Command, Sir P. B. William-Powlett distributed the prizes and gave the address. He said that for him, a naval officer, Friday 13th was an inauspicious day, and that he had always attempted to avoid any duty on that day; but he always found that a new experience was far more pleasant than the anticipation of it, and he hoped that this day would be, for Herschel, an auspicious one.

The theme of Sir William-Powlett's address was the necessity for discipline and service in any community. More people were becoming increasingly aware of the position of women in society, and he stressed how important it was for every girl to receive an education which would fit her to become a contributing member in her society. He pointed out that in actual fact discipline and service meant the same thing—a disciple is a follower or servant—but that neither could be taught; they were only to be learnt by each individual. And once learnt they would bring happiness in the joy of tolerance for, consideration and understanding of, and personal help to others.

"While life is full of froth and bubble,
Two things stand like stone—
Kindness in another's trouble,
Courage in your own."

LIBRARY NOTES

The members of the Committee have been very helpful throughout the year. Besides the routine duties of polishing furniture, attending to the flowers, issuing books, they spent much spare time classifying all the books under the Dewey Decimal System which was completed this year. This entailed the mechanical work of pasting in the pockets, writing the issue cards, and entering the numbers.

Thanks are also given to the members of Form V who sacrificed their preparation periods to help in the classification of the Library.

Miss Mitchell has rendered invaluable services in the care of the Fiction Library, where constant mending is necessary and the checking of "lost" books, all of which have been recovered or replaced by the defaulters.

THE OLD GIRLS' SOCIETY

The Library is greatly enhanced by the regular contribution of every new publication of the Van Riebeeck Society. The collection is complete up to date. This continued interest is greatly appreciated; we feel they have pleasant memories of hours spent in the Library.

While on the subject of Africana, there are many valuable books in that section, such as Mrs. Trotter's "Old Cape Colony," Laidler's "Tavern of the Ocean," etc., but we do not

possess Dorothea Fairbridge's "Historic Houses of South Africa," or Pearse's "Eighteenth Century Architecture," which unfortunately are beyond our means at the present price of Africana.

MEMBERS

The interest of members has been shown from the long lists of suggestions throughout the year; these have been carried out as far as possible, but the high cost of books prevents the fulfilment of all requests.

Latterly it has been possible to arrange for the review of books by members who certainly inspired others to rush to the shelves. It is hoped in the future to hold regular meetings for the discussion of books of every nature.

EQUIPMENT

The need is felt for a Picture Cabinet. Many valuable pictures collected from Newspapers and Magazines are lost for want of proper housing. These form an important part of education, and with the aid of our Epidiascope, add considerably to every branch of education. Perhaps pupils could be encouraged to donate, for the use of posterity, the interesting collections in their note books which are probably lost when they leave school.

LIGHTS IN THE LIBRARY

Last year the Vith Form suggested that we might improve the lighting and they set about finding the cost and the possibilities.

The plan decided on consisted of four 4-light fittings at the ends and two 6-light fittings in the middle, all of similar design. Of these the Vith Form gave one 4-light fitting, Miss Lansdale another, and Mr. Ales Hankey a 6-light one. This year the present Vith Form gave the other 6-light fitting, and at the Morning Market the Vth and the Upper IVth Forms each made enough on their stalls to supply the other 4-light ones. All these are now in the Library giving excellent light and adding considerably to the dignity of the room. May we thank all those who have been instrumental in having this done.

SHELVES

As we have feared (?) would happen eventually, we really have outgrown the existing shelves and many books are having to be kept outside the Library.

After much discussion it was decided that we must have new shelves, and plans and costs were obtained; then came the question of paying for them, as each was to cost £21 14s. 6d., and we needed four; first came an anonymous donor who gave us one; then we decided to have a Morning Market to raise the money for the other three and some repairs and filing equipment.

The Market was a great success, each of the Forms, V, Upper IV, Lower IV and Upper III ran a stall; the Junior School had one of their own and we opened the Art Room, the Swimming Bath, showed some films, and the Domestic Science Department served tea.

The result is given below and shows clearly how successful it was, as well as being most enjoyable; then, too, we shall have our shelves by the end of the year and have enough for the repairs and other equipment.

May we thank the parents, the staff and the School for their very generous help.

A STUDY COURSE IN CITIZENSHIP

This year the theme of the Course in Citizenship, which was held during September holidays, was "Citizenship—of Cape Town and Beyond."

We were glad to be able to entertain those studying the Course, on the opening day, at Herschel. Mr. Crouch opened the Course by telling us briefly the ideals of Citizenship. He said that we must broaden our minds by travelling and reading, so as to be able to help others and overcome racial prejudices.

We then had an interesting talk on the "Health of the World," by Professor Brock. After tea we had two further lectures on health. Dr. J. B. de Villiers spoke to us about the "Health of the Cape," and Miss Blagden described the work of "Student Clinics," clearly showing us the relationship between Student Clinics and the theme of the course by quoting their motto, "Do unto others as ye would they should do unto you."

The following day the meetings were held at Diocesan College. The subject under discussion was "Some Means of Living." Mr. Henry spoke to us about Money. Professor Brock then gave a lecture on Food, amazing us by saying that a large majority of the American population died from over-eating rather than malnutrition! The last lecture of the day was a talk on Homes by Miss Elsie Rowland.

On the afternoons of both Monday and Tuesday parties of us were taken to Cafda, Windermere and Langa, and everyone found these expeditions rather depressing but extremely interesting.

We were entertained on the last day by St. Cyprian's. In the morning we had a lecture on "Adult Education for Non-Europeans" by Mrs. Esther Wides which dealt mainly with night schools. Then Mr. Sargeant discussed Public Opinion, showing us how easily the public is deceived by propaganda. The final lecture of the morning was about "Books," given by Professor Bakdy.

In the afternoon we had a lecture on the "University," by Professor Rolfe, who tried to show us the value of the University for both work and social activities. We ended the Course with an Open Session, when we were asked to discuss the course we had attended and to give suggestions for future courses. It was decided that a representative from each school should form a committee to discuss plans for future courses.

Burns through her soul, behind the clouded eyes,
And he who watches, thinks how fair she seems,
Wrapped in her innocent delightful dreams.

SONIA BECK PRIZE ESSAY

*"Which has brought the richer reward to mankind—
The Search for Beauty or the Search for Knowledge?"*

"If thou of Fortune be bereft,
And in thy store there be but left
Two loaves, sell one, and with the dole
Buy hyacinths to feed thy soul."

Thus wrote the Persian, revealing in those lines the essence of beauty. "Nothing makes its way more directly to the soul than beauty," said Addison. What knowledge can give the sudden heart-stab of delight brought by the sight of a bird on the wing? Beauty is the food of the soul, as knowledge is the food of the intellect. The eternal search for knowledge is the striving of the mind for complete comprehension; the search for beauty is the craving of the soul for spiritual perfection.

Because of this power of touching the soul, beauty is more intensely personal than knowledge. The truth which Pythagoras discovered about the square on the hypotenuse is a fact, and nothing more; it exists independently of us; it is true because it can be proved. But beauty, like humour, does not exist for us until we perceive it; beauty is not a property of things. Some mutual relationship between "the seer and the seen" is necessary. Some men may see beauty where others are blind—Rupert Brooke could love "a reach of muddy pavement, or smoke from an engine at night."

Many have noticed this factor of communion in the perception of beauty, as opposed to the passive acceptance of knowledge by the mind. Of Creation—the practical expression of the search for beauty—Charles Morgan writes: "When we imagine with love, we create what we imagine, and what we then create has real and extending value." Notice the word "love." The love of the beautiful must enter into the creator, and by conveying this love through his art, he communicates with the receiver of it. But the projection of his personality into his art has been not an intellectual, but an ecstatic, act of the imagination.

What is the value of art to the receiver of it? Why is it that we do not all judge art by the same standards? The point is that no work of art is immortal of itself. Its value, says Charles Morgan, "depends not upon what it is, but upon what it has power to become." It must continually stimulate and extend the imagination of the receiver to a re-creation beyond the original.

Poetry in particular has this quality of abidingness. Words themselves have "a curious property of livingness." Sometimes it is a simple expression of emotion that touches us—

"She's such a little lassie—only six—
To toddle down that pathway to the Styx"

wrote a Roman poet, centuries ago, of a dead child. Sometimes a startlingly apt image that catches the imagination—

"... The holy time is quiet as a Nun
Breathless with adoration";

often it is the sheer beauty of expression—

"By the waters of Babylon, there we sat down, yea, we wept when we remembered Zion."

"Thus a great poem is continually being reinterpreted, and reapplied to contemporary life by successive ages."

The painter, too, tries not simply to record a sight or a vision but to recreate life upon the canvas, to capture in the picture his vision of spiritual beauty shining through the physical. "I believe in Michael Angelo, Velasquez, and Rembrandt; in the might of design, the mystery of colour, the redemption of all things by Beauty everlasting," wrote Shaw. It is thus that we should look at pictures, allowing them to stimulate our imagination to a higher vision.

Perhaps it is music that influences imagination the least obtrusively but the most strongly—

"When music sounds, all that I was I am
Ere to this haunt of brooding dust I came."

"Music," said Beethoven, "is a higher revelation than the whole of wisdom and the whole of philosophy."

The search for Beauty, then, has given us Art, the food of the imagination and the soul. What of Knowledge?

Men have sought knowledge in various fields. The search has given us much. Here are the facts which succeeding generations have gathered—knowledge of the earth and the universe, of ourselves as physical beings, of the peoples of the world today and yesterday. Here are the discoveries of medicine, science, industry, of nearly all the material foundations of modern life. In this there is much that is beneficial, but "This is a scientific age, in which man's knowledge has outrun his wisdom and he is haunted by the destructive power of his own inventions." And in this unhappiness, which is really insecurity, an unsatisfied desire for form and purpose in life, man realises that the material is not enough, that spiritual satisfaction is necessary, and that it cannot be attained only by knowledge.

For centuries men have also sought another kind of knowledge—the knowledge of their own souls and the truth of the mystery of life. This search has indeed the same goal as the search for beauty. Socrates himself, one of these knowledge-seekers, cried: "I pray Thee, O God, that I may be beautiful within." Even if we do not believe with Keats that Truth and Beauty are one, it is true that "wrought into the heart of a beautiful thing is the spirit of Truth itself." We must seek for truth in beauty—"It is only," wrote Schiller, "through the morning gate of the beautiful that you can penetrate into the realm of knowledge. That which we feel here as beauty, we shall one day know as truth." Robert Bridges summed up the whole question—

"Verily by Beauty it is that we come at Wisdom,
Yet not by Reason at Beauty."

"Not by Reason"—in any civilisation the arts precede science; the baby clutches at coloured beads before it learns its alphabet.

We may go as far as to say that the search for Beauty is the search for God himself, that "the beautiful gives us the highest revelation of God that we are allowed to see."

Again Charles Morgan states it aptly: "We feel within us that there is a vital form awaiting completion—if we did not feel that, there would be small reason to live at all. . . . This is the value of literature to the common reader, of pictures to the spectator, of music to the listener, of art to mankind. It impregnates him with the idea of form . . . it spurs him to imagine those things without the imagining of which he cannot know himself or be happy or at peace."

This being so, we may say that the search for Beauty has given man riches that the search for Knowledge could never give.

It is not by Knowledge that we come to God—eat of the Tree of Knowledge and "thou shalt surely die"—but in the search for Beauty we see the brightness of the skirts of God.

RHODES CENTENARY EXHIBITION

Bulawayo was a mass of colour during the visit of the Queen Mother and Princess Margaret. Decorations had been put up everywhere, and flags adorned every street. Along the route that the Royal visitors took large archways had been constructed with the word "Welcome" spelt along the top. At night the coloured lights lit up some of the streets and many of the main shops, making Bulawayo look very like a fairy-tale city.

The Exhibition was not situated far from the centre of the city. It was built on a plot of three acres, so there was space enough for wide roads, towns and, near the entrance, a stream. As transport, a trolley with benches and a covering over the top was pulled by a tractor. There were many places where people could buy teas or lunches.

The Exhibition was represented by many different countries. The South African Pavilion was one of the best. It was well laid out and there were many interesting things to see.

The East African Pavilions were excellent. Kenya had about twenty crocodiles of ten months' old and a baby leopard, Peggy, who was quite a pet with the general public. Skins of many kinds were shown in this section. There was also a miniature of Tree Tops Hotel, and one looked down on to a few live buck and some cleverly made rhinos.

Many of the native territories had natives standing at the entrance of the pavilions dressed up in the tribal costumes. Many people did not know what to make of them, and to find out if they were real would attempt to poke them. The natives, who by this time had become wise to this, suddenly made some movement.

They had a special pavilion portraying the life of Rhodes and the railway coach in which he travelled was shown by the Rhodesian Railways.

One of the greatest attractions was the native village, where the natives had on show all their crafts. There was many an artist, carver and modeller among them. Each day some entertainment, sometimes war dancing, sometimes fighting on stilts and many other amusements, was provided. The native band was most enthusiastic and put their heart and soul into playing their instruments.

In various parts of the grounds, shoe-blacks who took much delight in their job and did it as thoroughly as they could, offered their services to anyone wearing leather shoes.

Besides the mining pavilions, the Rhodesian pavilion, which was quite large, with a baobab tree in the centre and large paintings, showing typical Rhodesian scenes, on the walls, and the United Kingdom and U.S.A. exhibits, there were sources of interest such as the Glass Man, showing the blood circulation. To make the exhibits more interesting, various films were shown.

This exhibition showed the progress made by all the young African countries, and we are especially proud to note the future in store for Rhodesia.
