FOUNDERS DAY, 1955

Founders Day was held on the 18th February. During the morning the school attended the Service held in St. Saviour's Church; this was conducted by the Rev. John Aubrey, the lesson was read by Louine Barron and the choir sang the anthem, "With a voice of Singing" by Martin Shaw.

In his address, the Coadjutor Bishop of Cape Town appealed to every pupil in the school to use the opportunities given to her, and to develop her character and talents to the fullest extent so that she might take her place in the community and work for it in God's name. Each member has a personality and individuality which is different from the next, and God expects a sense of responsibility in us for this work. He will be poorer unless we give our service and ourselves.

During the afternoon the Prize-giving was held at the school, where His Grace, the Archbishop of Cape Town welcomed the guests and commended them on braving the violence of the elements. He also expressed his regrets that, owing to illness, the Headmistress, Miss McLean, was unable to be present. Mrs. A. J. Ballantine read the report:

Mrs. Grant, Your Grace, Ladies and Gentlemen, on behalf of Herschel, I welcome you here this afternoon—and it is a very special occasion. But first I would say how glad we are and, indeed, privileged, to have Mrs. Grant with us; we have many times chosen the wrong Friday to make this possible but now we welcome her, more especially as she is with us on the platform, and we look forward to hearing her speak to us.

Mrs. Grant, we thank you for being here today.

I feel that after seven years I can at last strike a new note and that is the special part about this afternoon and for which reason I shall be brief. I have, I think, repeated myself many times but there must always be repetition, in that for which we stand—Independence and the Education we try to give. The first is incorporated in our name,

as was so rightly said from this platform three years ago—an Independent School, rather than a Private School; there is nothing private about independence. The means by which the independence of the School is maintained is open to all—materialistically, quite simply shown on the balance-sheet, although it is not always so simple to keep the balance on the right side. But of far greater importance—Independence of thought, through the education we try to give. This I think is best summed up by quoting from William Temple—"Morality requires that you should treat a man as what he might be, as what he has in him to become; business requires that you trust a man as what he is; and you cannot get rid of that strain except by raising what he is to the level of what he might be, and that is the whole work of Education. Education should be primarily concerned with giving people the ability to pronounce judgment on any facts with which they are in contact, rather than supplying only the facts, but what is of supreme importance and value is the spirit of the place of instruction more than the actual instruction; at the same time we must ensure energy and efficiency in our midst and thus in our contact with the world of today."

It seems very mundane at this point to introduce our activities through the year, but they are the ways through which we seek to achieve this form of education and while one must record the results, it is not these which are of the greatest importance but the spirit through which they accrue.

Among past members of the School we would mention are Mary de Villiers, who obtained her B.A. at Rhodes University with Distinction in Sociology; Anne Robertson, who obtained her B.A. at Cape Town University with Distinction in History, was awarded the Queen Victoria Scholarship and has been accepted for Newnham to take Part II of the History Tripos; and Jean Pollard, who obtained B.Sc. Honours in Geography Class I, was awarded the Jamieson Scholarship and has applied to Newnham to do the Geography Tripos.

Of the 23 candidates who entered for the School Leaving Certificate, 19 passed, 3 in the first class, 8 in the second, 8 in the third, 12 received exemption from the Matriculation and one, distinction in Greek and Latin.

Thirty-four entered for the examinations of the Royal Schools of Music, all passed, 4 with distinction and 7 with merit.

On the games side a further 10 Bronze Medallions for Life Saving were gained and two Instructress Certificates, in the Inter-School Swimming Gala we took third place in the Senior Section, second place in the Intermediate and first in the Junior events; we had three representatives in the Provincial Schools Hockey XI and one in the second XI and these teams played while the English side was here; and in tennis we won the under 18 section.

Beyond these two obvious sides to school life there is a great deal more and most of this is fully reported in the Magazine published today. But it is these activities which contribute most to the kind of education defined by William Temple—in the Houses, where the interest in others is not only monetary but where an active interest is taken in the work judged to be the one which can best be helped by them, in the club activities—debating, music, science, sociological, the groups for discussion and appreciation of art, books and music; the dramatic activities, both senior and junior; the orchestra in school, joining with others for rehearsal and providing 23 members for the Joint Schools orchestra; the choir, who play so large a part in the life of the school as well as helping at St. Saviour's Church, both regularly and on special occasions; all these are voluntary occupations and are a training towards that balanced outlook which is able to pronounce judgment on facts and in its contact with the outside world.

But more than anything it is the spirit of the place of education which does most to help us reach our goal, a spirit which is there and of which I am proud and one for which I would thank you all who work so willingly with me and that means really every member of Herschel from the Chairman of the Council to the newest member of the Kindergarten; I only hope you do realise how sincere is my appreciation and how many the "every member" means.

And now for the special part—seven times I have said from this platform—"we need more space" and looked with longing and despair at the land next door, for it seemed always beyond our reach. But yesterday the transfer was finally accomplished and 4½ acres of that land, together with the house are ours—and our responsibility to see that both the Independence and the Spirit of the place of instruction are maintained—no light task but one which, after seven years' striving, I look to with renewed vigour and with the

added knowledge of so much such co-operation and help which awaits me from you all—members and friends of Herschel—past, present and to come.

You have had the details of the meeting held in May, its outcome and my plans for the future, as well as all that is needed to put this into effect. So far we have received or been promised £14,350 in donations, which, with the Extension Fund, and the interest-free loan of £5,000 from the Rhodes Trust, brings the total up to £23,550; still far short of the £40,000 which we need. There is, too, very much to do, but I know that with your help towards the energy and efficiency for which we strive we shall succeed, and all of us will be glad that we undertook the responsibility which awaited us.

I hope that I have left you time this afternoon to go and look at the House and see how really suitable it is for the purpose; there is too, work to be seen in the Art, Domestic Science and Science Rooms and I hope that you will see the Chapel for it is from there that so much of the Spirit of the place of instruction emanates—“man's Spirit, which is known not by his opinions but by his actions and his general conduct.”

Mrs. Grant, Your Grace, Ladies and Gentlemen, I thank you.

Miss McLean's report was followed by the prize-giving. Mrs. W. F. Grant presented the prizes and gave the address. She commended the school on the nature of the report and stressed the importance of an education of this sort in developing personalities best fitted for the future. But, she continued, with increasing opportunity lies the danger that one is tempted to neglect the most satisfying calling and go for the easy job; to bury talents which would lead to disappointment in unfulfilled personalities in later life. She also warned the pupils not to become too mechanised but to give thought to clear thinking and good judgment in all things. “Always ask yourselves whether the course you are following is the one in which you have been trained—in truth, justice and tolerance.”

Thanks were expressed to Mrs. Grant by the Rev. John Aubrey, after which the Archbishop invited the guests to tea where Mrs. Steyn received them on Miss McLean's behalf.

AFRIKAANS LIBRARY

This year the Afrikaans Library has been enlarged with the addition of many new books, made possible by the Abe Bailey Trust Fund, as well as generous contributions by the girls.

During this year a group of girls catalogued and tidied up the books. Owing to lack of space we have been unable to make use of all our books. Next year when the Juniors move to "The Hill" we shall be able to accommodate and catalogue all our new books and put them to a greater use.

THE CITIZENSHIP COURSE

The Citizenship Course took place as usual in the September holidays this year and the theme was, "The Responsibility of the Citizen."

Altogether thirteen schools in the Peninsula took part, and the opening and first day of the course was held at Wynberg Girls' High School. Three girls, Helen Steens, Sheila Warburton and Virginia Owen-Smith, represented Herschel, and were allotted to three of the six different groups into which the seventy-odd students were divided. Miss Currie, of Wynberg Girls' High School, opened the course, and in her speech stressed the necessity for individualism in the world, especially among the youth. She also spoke on choosing a career, and the importance of choosing one consistent with one's ability and circumstances, and not merely choosing one for its financial rewards.

The first lecture, "The Law and the Citizen," was given by Professor D. V. Cowan, Professor of Comparative Law at the University of Cape Town. He summed up his talk with Cicero's words, "We are slaves of the law that we may be free," and suggested that these famous words still apply today, and will tomorrow, if the law is correctly carried out. The next speaker, Mr. D. D'Ewes, assistant editor of the "Cape Times," took as his subject, "The Press and the Citizen." He reminded us that "facts are sacred, comment is free," and stressed the importance of differentiating between news and views in the press. In the afternoon groups visited the Austin Assembly Works, The Southern Life Association, the Law Courts or the Cape Argus.

On the second day we met at the Diocesan College. Miss Elsie Rowland, Housing Supervisor for the Cape Town Municipality, commenced the morning session with a lecture on Housing. She told us of her own work as a housing estate manager, and spoke of the difficulties of housing in this country, the application of the Group Areas Act, and the long waiting lists for houses. After tea Dr. Stewart, Deputy Medical Officer of Health in Cape Town, spoke on Health Services. He was followed by Dr. Cormack, Medical Superintendent of the Wynberg group of hospitals, who gave us an idea of the management and organisation of hospitals in the Cape. After lunch parties visited Athlone and Windermere, Wynberg hospital and Maitland Cottage Homes.

The third and final day was held at St. Cyprian's. The first lecture by Mr. D. W. Allen, Manager of the Board of Executors in Cape Town, was on "The Ethics of Finance." He spoke about the rules of moral conduct in the government of money, the investment of public money, the choice of suitable shares and the effect on Wall Street of world events. "Banking" was the subject of Mr. Crankshaw's talk. He is the General Manager's assistant in Barclay's Bank. He dealt with early monetary systems, the present-day bank and its uses, and cleared up some interesting points put forward on black market organisation. Mr. Shutte, manager of the Southern Life Insurance Association, spoke on "Insurance," and defined it as the means of taking the responsibility off the individual and sharing it among as many people as possible. In the afternoon, Mr. Sholto-Grant of Robb's Motors and Miss J. Paterson of Garlick's Store, gave us an idea of business organisation in the motor business and the large departmental store.

These were the last lectures of the course. Miss Currie then gave us a summary of the important points of every lecture. After a few suggestions had been made for improving the course in the future, a member of each visiting party made a few remarks about each visit.

Altogether the course was most instructive and enjoyable. Being divided into groups gave us an excellent opportunity of mixing with the other schools attending the course. We were very fortunate in being able to take part in this course, and feel it will benefit us in our preparation for the future.

DRAMA IN THE SIXTEENTH CENTURY AND TODAY

The field of drama is anything but small; plays have been written and produced since 2000 B.C., and up to the present day there is not the remotest possibility of the art dying. Yet, as any art must, in order to survive, change and mould its form to the age in which it finds itself, so drama has through the ages altered considerably as to style and expression of thought.

Any art may be divided as to its history into fairly definite periods. Such as Music into Baroque, Classical, Romantic, Impressionistic and Modern. Painting and Sculpture into Egyptian, Greek, Byzantine, Romanesque, Baroque, etc., and Drama into Greek Drama, Medieval Pageants, Elizabethan, Restoration and Realism.

On writing a play of any description the playwright with any notions towards success from the audience's point of view will have two things at the back of his mind—firstly, what type of stage and theatre is available, and, secondly, what the current public opinion is, or what would have the best effect on the box office. There are of course those authors who write solely to satisfy their own ideas, and to express their viewpoints, but even these will think of the above-mentioned facts to some extent.

There is the world of difference between the Elizabethan stage and the Modern stage; in many respects the Modern stage is improved, but it also has its drawbacks.

The keyword of the Elizabethan stage is its simplicity. It consisted of three parts—the front stage, which extended into the arena or pit, was any open space, market place or field. Then there was the back stage, which was roofed in contrast to the rest of the theatre, and which was recognized as a room or enclosed area. Lastly, the upper stage represented the walls of a city, window or any elevated place. This simplicity of stage-setting encouraged a rapidity of action, which is rendered practically

impossible by the elaborate and cumbersome scenic devices of the Modern theatre. During the sixteenth century people were encouraged to use their imaginations, of which many examples are given to us.

For instance, in Christopher Marlowe's "Jew of Malta" Barabas announces his intention of going to the market place to buy a slave.

Lodowick: "And, Barabas, I'll bear thee company."

Barabas: "Come then—here's the market place. What's the price of this slave?"

The lack of movable scenery exercised four influences on the drama written at that time. There was an indifference to all considerations of locality and the unity of the place, as well as the time lapses between scenes.

Numerous minor scenes which break up the plot constitute a perplexity to modern managers, and a source of confusion to modern theatregoers.

With the absence of a drop curtain the dead had to be carried away with some reason given to the audience. Such as Cornwall, in "King Lear," act iii, scene vii: "Throw this slave upon the dunghill." And in Henry IV, act iv, scene iv, the dying king says: "Bear me hence into some other chamber."

But more important in connection with the absence of a drop curtain is the fact that Shakespeare rounds off his scenes and acts, while the modern playwright is continuously contriving an effective "curtain." He works a scene up to its thrilling climax and closes it abruptly, leaving the incident incomplete. Shakespeare could not do this, often ending with an anti-climax.

The fourth and last influence of the absence of movable scenery is that there is very little direction at the beginning of a play, and yet a wealth of description in the general dialogue.

For example, "Macbeth," act i, scene vi. The direction is simply "Before Macbeth's castle," and there follows the people who are to enter. Then the king describes it as having a "pleasant seat," and Banquo enlarges upon it by describing the gentle air, and remarking on the many birds.

But take as a contrast the directions for the first scene of Bernard Shaw's "Saint Joan": "A fine spring morning on the river Meuse, between Lorraine and Champagne, in the year 1429 A.D., in the castle of Vaucouleurs. Captain Robert de Bandricourt, a military squire, handsome and physically energetic, but with no will of his own, is disguising that defect in his usual fashion by staring terribly at his steward, a trodden worm, scanty of flesh, scanty of hair, who might be any age from eighteen to fifty-five, being the sort of man whom age cannot wither because he has never bloomed."

"The two are in a sunny stone chamber on the first floor of the castle. At a plain, strong oak table, seated in a chair to match, the captain presents his left profile. The steward stands facing him at the other side of the table, in so deprecatory a stance as his can be called standing. The mullioned thirteenth-century window is open behind him. Near it in the corner is a turret with a narrow arched doorway leading to a winding stair which descends to the courtyard. There is a stout four-legged stool under the table, and a wooden chest under the window."

Yet this long description of the scene and characters is not at all unusual for the modern playwright.

At the introduction of scenery the inner stage was used far more extensively, consequently it became infinitely more important and gradually absorbed the outer stage. This absorption resulted in the most important drawback of the modern theatre. With a pit and a row of footlights between the actors and audience the contact and stimulus of imagination has been lost. Although the modern theatre has been improved tremendously by lighting, mechanical and scenic devices as well as records and acoustics, it has grown away from the very essence of the original theatre. Modern playwrights and theatre managers, in Canada, for example, are trying to get this contact back by building theatres in the sixteenth century style.

This leads us directly on to the second necessity for a successful play—the people.

The typical Elizabethan loved fighting, brutality, ghosts and devils. Comedies had to be vulgar, but, curiously enough, they appreciated good verse and were quick to applaud an oration which stimulated their imagination. Another contrast between the "make-believe" fairyland of the Elizabethan drama and the modern realistic attitude is the development of verse to prose. This in itself typifies the great change from the imaginative Elizabethan ideas.

During the sixteenth century the production of a play did not worry the audience in the slightest. In the costumes, for example, anybody wearing a "Turkish bonnet" and sporting a scimitar passed easily as any Eastern character. He was a Roman if he wore a breastplate and carried a sword. The audience were quick to approve a good play, and just as quick to let the actors know that they did not like it.

But today the accent is more on production. We have not the profusion of outstanding playwrights that that former age had, and although we have writers (many of them) only a few may be compared with Jonson, Marlowe and Shakespeare.

Therefore there tends to be a surplus of re-enacted Shakespearian plays, in the production of which the stage managers are trying to revert back to the Shakespearian atmosphere.

Samuel Johnson says:

"The stage but echoes back the public voice,
The drama's laws, the drama's patrons give,
For that we live to please, must please to live."

The playwright must "please to live," and so did Ben Jonson. He, like the sixteenth century playwrights, did not create real characters, but over-exaggerated "types"; this the people loved, and heartily approved of a simple farce in which everything was "make-believe."

In complete contrast do we find the modern play. As Macaulay says: "The real object of drama is the exhibition of human character." We no longer find plays about kings, queens and the nobility; drama is now centred around the ordinary middle-class man, his life and home, typical of many. He is now a real man, not simply a stage character. Terence Rattigan is a great writer along these lines, he is typical of the modern school of drama—Realism.

In modern drama, especially in America and France, there is a great disillusionment as to life generally. Williams is terribly depressing, and in Christopher Fry's "A Lady's not for Burning" his theme is that the best way to live is to die. But in the English theatre there is a determination to produce comedies (maybe the effect of two disastrous wars), and out of the conventional comedies many different types have grown, two of which are the satiric comedy reflected by Noel Coward and Somerset Maugham, and the domestic comedy typified by Rattigan.

Among the more serious dramas produced today we find examples such as Verse Drama, in which a reversion from prose to verse finds itself in the hands of T. S. Eliot; and the Drama of Ideas, the chief exponents of which are Shaw and Galsworthy. This Drama of Ideas is interesting in that, instead of simply writing a play, the author endeavours to express an idea or viewpoint at the same time.

Compared with modern writers it is interesting to note that Shakespeare's method is much more nearly allied to the method of the epic poet or romance writer, since, like them, he habitually follows his plot through a succession of minor scenes in which he directly exhibits transitional movements which the modern playwright would give in the form of an explanatory narrative.

All these changes and many others have taken place, but drama is always fundamentally the same. The following quotation from "East of Eden," by Steinbeck, is equally true for a drama:

"A great story is about everyone or it will not last. The strange and foreign is not interesting—only the deeply personal and familiar . . . no story has power, nor would it last, unless we felt in ourselves that it is true and true of us."
